

Just, as I Am

Revelation 15:1-8

Big Idea: God is great, almighty, just, true, holy, and righteous. We cannot earn His presence — but through faith in Christ, His righteousness becomes ours. That is the Gospel. That is our song of deliverance.

Day 1: The Greatness
of God

Reading:
Psalm 145:1-13

It is easy to move through a day without pausing to consider who God truly is. Yet Scripture declares that His greatness is unsearchable — beyond the reach of our full comprehension. David did not let that mystery silence him. Instead, it drove him to worship. When we begin to measure our circumstances against the limitless greatness of God, our problems shrink and our praise grows. Take time today to speak God's greatness back to Him in prayer. Name specific ways He has shown His power in your life. Greatness acknowledged becomes worship offered.

Reflection: In what areas of your life have you forgotten how great God is?

Practical Application: Write down three moments from the past month where God demonstrated His greatness on your behalf. Pray over each one with gratitude.

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Day 2: The Justice and
Truth of God

Reading:
Deuteronomy 32:1-4;
Psalm 119:156-160

We live in a culture that has grown deeply suspicious of truth. Institutions, media, and even relationships have left many people wondering what they can actually trust. God's Word stands in sharp contrast to this uncertainty. Every word He speaks is true. Every judgment He renders is just.

He does no wrong. His ways are perfect. This is not a God who adjusts His standards based on circumstances or popular opinion. He is the same yesterday, today, and forever. When the world feels unstable, the truth of God is the solid ground beneath your feet. Stand on it without apology.

Reflection: Where are you tempted to doubt God's truth or question His justice in your current circumstances?

Practical Application: Choose one promise from Scripture that you have struggled to fully believe.

Write it down, pray over it, and commit to returning to it each day this week.

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Day 3: The Holiness of God and the Call to Worship

Reading:
Psalm 96:1-13;
Isaiah 6:1-8

When Isaiah encountered the holiness of God, his first response was not comfort — it was conviction. He saw himself clearly only because he first saw God clearly. Holiness is not a distant theological concept. It is the very nature of God that makes worship both necessary and transforming. We are called to worship the Lord in the splendor of His holiness, not because we have earned access, but because Christ has made a way. The closer we draw to a holy God, the more we recognize our own need — and the more we treasure the grace that covers it.

Reflection: How often do you approach God with a genuine sense of His holiness rather than treating prayer as routine?

Practical Application: Set aside ten minutes today in silence before you begin praying. Allow yourself to think about who God is before you bring Him your requests. Let worship come before

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Day 4: Deliverance, the
Song of Moses, and the
Song of the Lamb

Reading:
Exodus 15:1-13;
Revelation 15:2-4

The Israelites stood on the far bank of the Red Sea with the evidence of God's deliverance still settling around them. Their response was immediate and unrestrained — they sang. The tribulation saints in Revelation do the same, singing the song of Moses and the song of the Lamb. Both songs celebrate the same God who rescues His people from impossible situations. You may not be standing at the edge of a parted sea today, but you are standing somewhere that God has brought you through. The question is whether you are singing. Deliverance remembered is worship renewed.

Reflection: What has God delivered you from that you have stopped celebrating?

Practical Application: Write your own brief song or prayer of deliverance. It does not need to be polished. Simply put into your own words what God has rescued you from

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Day 5: Righteousness by
Faith and the Hope of
the Gospel

Reading:
Romans 3:21-26;
Romans 4:1-5

The most humbling and liberating truth in all of Scripture is this: no one earns their way into the presence of a righteous God. All have sinned and fall short of His glory. Yet through faith in Jesus

Christ, that same righteousness is counted to us as a gift. Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness. The same is true for every person who places genuine trust in Christ. This is not a reward for good behavior. It is grace — unearned, undeserved, and completely sufficient. The righteous shall live by faith. That is the foundation on which every day of your life can be built.

Reflection: Are you resting in the righteousness of Christ, or are you still trying to earn your standing before God through your own efforts?

Practical Application: Identify someone in your life who does not yet know Jesus. Commit to
